## Featuring anniversary celebration of dinosaur

PHILADELPHIA—This fall The Academy of Natural Sciences kicks off a months-long celebration of dinosaurs by mounting "*Hadrosaurus foulkii*: The Dinosaur That Changed The World" and hosts the annual Philadelphia Shell Show with a new festival of fun activities for the whole family.

In November, the Academy will remount a cast of the plant-eater *Hadrosaurus foulkii* to mark the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of its scientific description. When it was placed on exhibit at the Academy 1868, *Hadrosaurus foulkii* was the first mounted dinosaur skeleton displayed anywhere in the world.

For Halloween, what better way to explore the freaks of nature than to spend the night in the haunted halls and galleries of the oldest natural science museum in America.

The following activities are **free** with museum admission unless otherwise noted:

# PHILADELPHIA SHELL SHOW Saturday and Sunday, October 11-12

Exotic treasures of the seas will be on display and for sale at the annual Philadelphia Shell Show, the largest shell show in the Northeast. Dozens of collectors and amateur scientists will compete for prizes, and craftspeople will showcase their masterpieces. Visitors can shop for the upcoming holidays from an array of stunning shells, shell crafts, jewelry, books and shell-themed accessories. Academy scientists will guide visitors on behind-the-scenes tours through the museum's world-renowned mollusk collection. Enjoy free shells for kids, naturalist presentations and craft-making. At the same time as the Shell Show, and extending an additional day to Oct. 13, the Academy hosts a Shell Festival, featuring squid dissections and shell games. Free with regular museum admission.

# SHELL FESTIVAL Saturday, Sunday and Monday, October 11-13

The Academy celebrates the annual Philadelphia Shell Show (Oct. 11 and 12) with additional fun activities at the museum's Science Live Station for three days. Explore the mysteries of cephalopod biology with squid dissections at 11:45 a.m., 1:45 p.m. and 3:30 p.m. Play our new Shell Game by matching the shell with the animal that calls it home at 10:30 a.m., noon, 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. Free with regular museum admission.

#### HALLOWEEN SPOOK-TACULAR SLEEPOVER Saturday, October 25, 6:30 p.m. – Sunday, October 26, 9 a.m.

Celebrate the strange, weird, creepy world of nature. Stay over night in the murky and mysterious Academy of Un-Natural Sciences next to Mesozoic monsters and mummies and find out what other strange creatures lurk the halls and research collections after dark. A costume contest kicks off the evening, with prizes for most creative, scariest and best costume in each age group, as well as a best-group costume prize. # New Exhibit "HADROSAURUS FOULKII: THE DINOSAUR THAT CHANGED THE WORLD" November 22 - April 19, 2009

The dinosaur that changed the world, *Hadrosaurus foulkii*, rises again for a months-long celebration of dinosaurs. *Hadrosaurus foulkii* occupies a singular place in the history of American paleontology. At the time of its scientific description in 1858, it was the most complete dinosaur skeleton unearthed and it was found in Haddonfield, N.J. When it was placed on exhibit at The Academy of Natural Sciences in 1868, it was the first mounted dinosaur skeleton displayed anywhere in the world. To mark the 150th anniversary of its description, the Academy will remount a cast of this plant-eating dinosaur as the centerpiece of a special exhibit and months-long dinosaur celebration. Free with regular museum admission.

Live animals will be roaming the halls (with their handlers) for a close-up meet-and-greet. Live Animal Shows at 11 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. Make an animal craft to take home.

#### Monday, Dec. 29, Butterfly Day

Learn about the fascinating life cycle of the butterfly and see an array of butterfly specimens from around the world that will be on display. Live animal shows at 11a.m. and 2:30 p.m. Make a butterfly craft to take home.

The drama of the diorama comes to life. Learn the fascinating history of our historic dioramas through storytelling and touching furs and skulls of the diorama animals. Live animal shows at 11 a.m. and 2:30 pm. Make your own diorama craft to take home.
