WHAT: "ENDS OF THE EARTH: FROM POLAR BEARS TO PENGUINS," new exhibition

Visitors will experience the unique nature of Earth's extreme ends through interactive games, mounted penguins and polar bears, touchable animal skulls, real artifacts and fascinating videos of real-life explorers. Participate in experiments about temperature drops and cold-weather animals.

Noon-2 p.m. Rinky, the Blue Cross RiverRink giant penguin mascot, greets visitors.

2:30 p.m. Live animal shows featuring Arctic animals: Great Horned Owl, Peregrine Falcon,
