Women In Natural Sciences (WINS) is celebrating its 35th anniversary on May 9th, 2018 with a fundraiser *WINS 35*. As you all probably know, WINS is a groundbreaking program that has made a profound difference in the lives of many young women in Philadelphia.

The keynote speaker for the afternoon event *WINS 35* will be Lisa Dyson, PhD, CEO of Kiverdi, a technology company whose mission is to develop innovations that go beyond traditional agriculture to help feed and power a growing world. Dyson developed a bio-process that uses natural microbes to convert carbon dioxide into the proteins and oils that we use today for sustenance and power industry.

Dyson will receive the newly established WINS Award, which honors an outstanding female innovator in the STEM field, whose visionary contributions in science have made a positive impact on the world.
