My First Fossil Hunt

As part of an NSF grant, Dr. Ted Daeschler, the Academy's VP of Systematics & Library and Associate Curator of Vertebrate Paleontology, gave a three-part series on "fossil hunting" to the WINS II. The first part was "Fossil Field Work: Where, Why and How"; the second was the "hunt" itself, and the third was "Curation and Research of Fossils". The below article is about the fossil hunt in the Red Hill area of Renovo, PA.

On my first real fossil hunt, I went with a selected group of WINS and we were lucky enough to be under the leadership of Dr. Ted Daeschler, or as they call him in the Paleo Lab - "The King of Vertebrate Paleontology". When I first stepped onto the bus, my stomach turned with anxiety and excitement. I was going to be out in the field, like a real researcher - no one knows how intimidating that can be. In the Academy's Paleo Lab, I always talk about what goes on during a real life dig, but this time I was actually going to experience it myself.

It just so happens that the restaurant was playing country music (my favorite type of music!). As I was singing to every song that came on, Dr. Daeschler laughed and said "Country huh, I never would have guessed...I'm more of a sports radio guy..." This joke broke the ice and led to a great night of conversation. I must say that this was one of the best trips I've ever taken.
